Grade 3/4 Class

Aanii! We've been busy in the 3/4 class, let me share what we've been up to!

Language - We have been working so hard to become more tech-savvy so that the technology we have available can support our learning. We now know how to navigate Google Classroom and Google Docs. We can use voice-to-text to type by speaking and text-to-voice to have any words read to us outloud; now we can all read anything, regardless of our current reading level, and we can all communicate in writing, regardless of our spelling skills or the legibility of our handwriting. This has really opened the door to tackling more difficult content and concepts (like the nuances involved in creating more complex sentences) as we move into our story writing unit. Exciting times!

Math - With a solid foundation in addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, we are now understanding how to approach more 'real-world' math by learning to solve 'word problems' that describe a situation involving numbers instead of being given the equations to solve. The goal here is being able to see the relationships between numbers and figuring out our own equations. Before the end of the year, we will apply our skills in data analysis and algebra.

Health - We continue to focus on health under the umbrella of regulation and looking after ourselves. We've talked a lot about reactive regulation (responding to hard feelings), but this month we are taking a step back and learning about how to increase our ability to cope with difficulty by taking care of ourselves. We know we need to get enough sleep, eat often enough, drink enough water, and not spend too much time looking at screen, but we had to use technology to learn exactly what is 'enough' when it comes to sleep, food, and water, and what is 'too much' when it comes to being on devices. Knowing ourselves and what it takes to stay regulated is the goal.

Science - World Water Day sparked an interest in the water cycle and the fact that the water we drink today is the same water that has always existed on our planet. We made terrariums, planted seeds, watered them, and sealed them up. Our plants are growing, despite no water being added, because we made mini-ecosystems that have the water cycle at work.

Socials - We have begun our cultural studies / geography projects by learning about landforms and population needs; we are building islands with various landforms and populating these islands in a way that preserves the environment and provides the communities with the resources they need. From here, we will move into the historical study of Wasauksing.

Arts - We are working on an instrumental performance for the spring concert. It's hard work and will take a lot of persistent practice, but we'll get there, and we're excited to show off our efforts! We continue with creation stations on Fridays when we practise our skills to make new things.
